Daily tooth brushing is the best way to protect your pet's dental health.1

How to brush your pet's teeth:

SET THE TIME AND PLACE

Choose the time of day and place you will brush your pet's teeth. When the time comes, go to the chosen place and call your pet. When your pet comes, reward them with a taste of pet toothpaste and plenty of praise. Repeat the routine every day. After a few days or weeks, your pet will show up on their own, expecting the treat. Be patient and consistent — building a lifetime habit takes time.

LIGHTLY TOUCH YOUR PET'S HEAD

Once your pet is used to the toothbrush, touch their head so lightly that you can barely feel the hair on your palm. If your pet gets nervous, direct their attention to the toothpaste on the brush. Once the pet cleans the toothbrush, give praise and reward with more toothpaste. Each day, add a little pressure until your pet ignores your hand and eats the toothpaste from the brush.

BUILD TRUST IN THE PET TOOTHBRUSH

STEP: Once your pet learns to meet you at your daily "appointment," put the pet toothpaste on the toothbrush and let them lick it off. Once the toothbrush is licked clean, reward your pet with another taste of toothpaste. Repeat until they don't hesitate at the sight of the brush. Again, be patient and consistent.

TOUCH YOUR PET'S MOUTH

Now, when you place your hand on your pet's head, move your forefinger and thumb to the corner of its mouth and gently pull back the cheek to reveal a few teeth. Dab the loaded toothbrush on the teeth quickly and reward with more toothpaste. Repeat daily until your pet doesn't balk when you touch its mouth. Gradually expose and brush more of your pet's teeth.
