- Flea/Tick preventative medication for each animal

Other Supplies

- Leash, collar, and harness
- ID tags, and rabies tags, firmly attached to collar
- Toys
- Appropriate sized pet carrier with bedding, blankets or towels
- Pet First Aid kit and First Aid book
- Cleaning supplies for accidents
- Dog bags

- Cotton swabs or cotton balls
- Antiseptic lotion/powder/spray
- Hand sanitizer or wipes
- Instant hot and cold packs
- Alcohol swabs

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Pet Emergency Plan

Plan Ahead

Most emergency shelters will not accept pets that are not service animals due to health and safety concerns. It's a good idea to have a list of phone numbers and locations that are pet-friendly. Remember to include your friends and family!

- Know which hotels and motels along your escape route accept pets. If you
 can call ahead, it's a good idea. You can ask if the no pets policy can be
 waived in the case of an emergency.
- Your pets may be more comfortable together, but you should be prepared to house them separately. Make sure to have a separate kit for each animal.
- Make sure to keep your pet's ID and multiple copies of up-to-date vaccination records with you. Most shelters will require these to reduce the spread of disease.
- Be sure to include your pets in emergency drills. The more often they are included, the more comfortable they will be getting into and travelling in their carriers.
- If your pet is easily upset or has anxiety around travel, it may help to speak with your veterinarian about having a store of emergency sedatives to make the situation less stressful.
